UNISON NI Regional Council meets to agree future strategy for 2022

UNISON NI Regional Council met on Friday 22nd October to reflect on our achievements over the past year, debate future strategy, and elect the incoming Regional Committee for 2021-2023. Delegates from across NI agreed Resolutions that cover some of the key issues currently facing UNISON includina:

- our manifesto for challenging governments on the UNISON agenda,
- investing in, and protecting, our health, education, community & voluntary services,
- climate change.
- equality and human rights,
- tackling poverty including child poverty.

Chaired by Joint Regional Convenors Gabrielle Carton and James Large, delegates from across NI received a keynote address from UNISON General Secretary Christina McAnea. Christina recognised the major challenges our members

continue to face in the workplace and with employers during the pandemic. She further paid tribute to members and activists in Northern Ireland for the major contributions they continue to make to our union's agenda, both domestic and international; and for their constant vigilance on the peace process and the threats posed to it by political instability and the impact of Brexit. UNISON NI Regional Secretary Patricia McKeown updated delegates on the key policy and organisational issues facing the union.

Regional Committee reaffirms what UNISON stands for - democracy, collective action, solidarity, equality, human rights and inclusion

Regional Council Resolution 1 states,

'As division in our society deepens, much of the intolerance warned of in previous Regional Council resolutions, has become reality. Now, more than ever, we need to reaffirm the principles upon which our union is built.

'Our union has increasingly come under attack by politicians and others opposed to our democratic principles and core policies on democracy, equality and human rights. It is a function of UNISON to seek to influence political parties to adopt our agenda and not the other way around. We reaffirm the decision Council took at the outset of UNISON that we would not affiliate to any political party, nor will we permit any party to use our union to its own ends. Council further pledges to support any member or activist who may come under pressure for standing up for UNISON's principles and core values'.

Moving the motion Regional Convenor Gabrielle Carton said, "I am dedicated to UNISON because of what we stand for – democracy,

collective action, solidarity, equality, human rights and inclusion.

"I am proud of the fact that members and activists put the union first, above their own personal and political allegiances. I am proud of the fact that from the very start of UNISON, this Regional Council took the decision that we would not affiliate to, or align with, any political party, and that includes the Labour Party.

"Over the years we have had elected politicians, who have also been UNISON activists. They have understood that this union cannot, and will not, be used by any party in its own interests. It now appears that we have those in our ranks who do want to use this union, and we will stand against them" (Continued on Page 2, Column 1)

(Continued from Page 1, Column 2) "UNISON members are unionists, nationalists, republicans, loyalists, socialists, communists, social democrats and people with no political allegiance at all. We have made space for them all and will not tolerate any party or faction attempting to stack our branch committees or use our resources for their own political gain. All of us, and those who have gone before us, have

built a proud union in the face of conflict and political division outside. We cannot tolerate it coming inside our union. Our members have much bigger fights to fight.

Delegates, we represent the rainbow coalition of UNISON members. Our job is to make all political parties listen to us – not the other way around.

I am calling on Council to support this motion, to reaffirm what we stand for and to take action to protect the values, beliefs and principles of this union".

Our manifesto for change - Regional Council Resolutions

Regional Council Resolutions support action and campaigns in some of the key issues currently facing UNISON. They include:

- support to all branches for the development of democratic structures and enhanced bargaining activity with the clear purpose of advancing our members' rights (R2),
- support for members to access immigration advice through UNISON Legal Services (R3),
- maximising facility time from employers to ensure activists can carry out union duties and undergo relevant training (R4),
- ending privatisation of nursing staff (R5),
- incorporating contractual sick pay into all contracts of employment across the outsourced, privatised, community and voluntary sectors (R6),
- agreeing UNISON's core demands as part of our political campaigning leading into the 2022 NI Assembly election and the period that follows (R7),
- supporting climate justice and action around COP 26 (R8),
- opposition to mining in the Sperrins and Gorteen Glens in Tyrone (R9),
- opposition to **gold mining** in the Sperrin Mountains and Inishowen peninsula (R10),
- intensifying our efforts to make free school meals for all a reality (R11,)
- prioritising staff health and wellbeing during and post COVID (R12),
- Prioritising mental health in the workplace as a trade union issue (R13),
- supporting the relaunch of the Feminist Recovery Plan and lobbying the NI Executive to develop an effective strategy

- that will address these inequalities and ensure that it does not fall on the backs of women (R14),
- supporting the rights of older people to treatment during the pandemic (R15),
- seeking pension justice for 'WASPI'
 Women (R16),
- designating Galway House and NW
 Resource Centre as Apartheid Free Zones
 in solidarity with the Palestinian people
 (R17).

Regional Council registers vote of no confidence in UNISON NEC

Regional Council also debated, and carried, 3 emergency motions expressing a vote of no confidence in recent decisions by the NEC to change UNISON rules without National Delegate Conference approval as set out in the rule book.

The motions also registered strong support for our General Secretary Christina McAnea.

As Resolutions, they have been passed to the NEC and we have received a communication from the union's Presidential Team advising that there are 3 legal opinions on the matter and that positive discussions are now taking place with the General Secretary and the Presidential Team.

We are advised that once these are concluded a further statement is to be issued.



Vote YES for strike action on NJC pay!

We are asking members working in schools and on NJC terms and conditions to vote YES for strike action in the current pay ballot.

If this applies to you, you will already have received important voting papers through the post in early December.

Every member must post their ballot back by 10th February 2022.



Have your say on HSC Pay!

Members working in health and social care will have received an email link or a postal form to take part in UNISON NI's consultation on HSC pay. We need a strong mandate from you to challenge - using legal industrial action when required - not only on your pay but also on safe staffing and the crippling overspend on the use of agencies to plug holes in the health staff workforce. The consultation ends on 14th January 2022.


UNISON College – Activist and Member Learning Programme

Our UNISON College Activist and Member Learning Programme continues to be identified as one of our most important areas of work. It continues to give support to members and activists especially at a time when employers are cutting back on their training and development programmes.

We offer over 180 workshops for all members across 90 topics such as autism, health & safety, palliative care, resilience, bereavement, communicating effectively, interview skills, drugs and alcohol, epilepsy, Parkinson's disease, suicide awareness, dealing with challenging behaviour and Makaton.

All of our courses are now hosted at www.unisoncollegeni.org.uk. If you open the page on your phone, you can save it onto your own homepage as an app style icon. Just set up an account and, once approved, you can book, track and cancel courses from the convenience of your phone, tablet or computer. Our courses are currently taking place online.
